So what exactly is a theme wedding, and what does it entail? According to Hannah, it expresses a central theme that carries through at least four of the six basic aspects of a wedding: the stationery, favours, venue, setting, wedding attire and food. "Just having wedding invites that feature elements of the beach does not mean that you have a beach theme wedding," she adds. But how does one go about ensuring that the wedding theme is one that is truly unique to the couple?

By eliminating the usual facets of a full-on wedding, the principle planner, Hannah, was able to tocus on the reflective nature of the couple.
